




How would you describe the problem of fentanyl, heroin, and meth use in your area over the last couple of years?





Would you say Measure 110 has made Oregon's homeless crisis better, worse, or has it had no impact?



Ballot Measure Vote

- Next November, there could be a measure on the Oregon ballot that proposes changes to Ballot Measure 110, the state's drug decriminalization law. Knowing this, would you vote yes to change the law or no to keep the law as is?
- In simple terms, a Yes vote would change but not repeal Measure 110 by recriminalizing the personal possession of fentanyl, heroin, and meth. It would maintain existing funding for drug treatment from cannabis taxes but make treatment required not voluntary as an alternative to jail.
- A No vote would keep Measure 110 in place and personal possession of fentanyl, heroin, and meth would remain decriminalized. Cannabis tax dollars would continue to fund a range of services meant to reduce the harm to users and allow them to voluntarily go to treatment.





- Going into treatment should be required of people charged multiple times with possession or use of fentanyl, heroin, and meth



Decriminalizing Drugs made Overdoses Worse

Since Measure 110 was passed in 2020, total overdoses from drugs like heroin and fentanyl have more than tripled to over 1,500 deaths in Oregon. Knowing this, which comes closer to your opinion?

- The overdoses were made worse by Oregon decriminalizing drugs.







Do you support or oppose changing Measure 110 to make possession and use of fentanyl, heroin, and meth a crime again?






The Debate Over Measure 110

Now I'd like to read you a few arguments from both sides of the debate. After hearing each statement, please tell me if you would agree with those who are voting yes to change measure 110 or those who are voting no to keep measure 110 as is. If you aren't sure, just say that.

Voluntary vs. Mandatory Treatment

Those who will vote Yes say the current \$100 fines that few people pay, and a 1-800 hotline number aren't proving to be enough of an incentive. They say that to deliver on the promise of Measure 110, law enforcement must have the power to require those caught using hard drugs, especially in public places, to choose between accepting treatment or going to jail.

Those who will vote No say Measure 110 is working because it uses cannabis tax dollars to fund incentives for voluntary treatment for people who suffer from addiction while keeping them safe from police. Law enforcement should not have the power to make people choose between accepting drug treatment or going to jail.



Needs More Time


Those who will vote Yes say we're in the midst of a drug addiction, homeless and public safety crisis made worse by Measure 110. In Multnomah County alone, overdose deaths from opioids are up over 500% in the past 4 years. Overdose deaths are 36% higher among Blacks than whites. Oregon now has the highest number of deaths of children under 18 from drugs in the nation. We need to fix Measure 110 to save lives and restore safety.

Those who will vote No say Measure 110 is showing progress and needs more time to work. After a slow start, cannabis tax dollars are now funding addiction treatment centers across the state. People seeking treatment is up nearly 50% and arrests for drug possession are down 65%. Now is not the time to go backwards.




